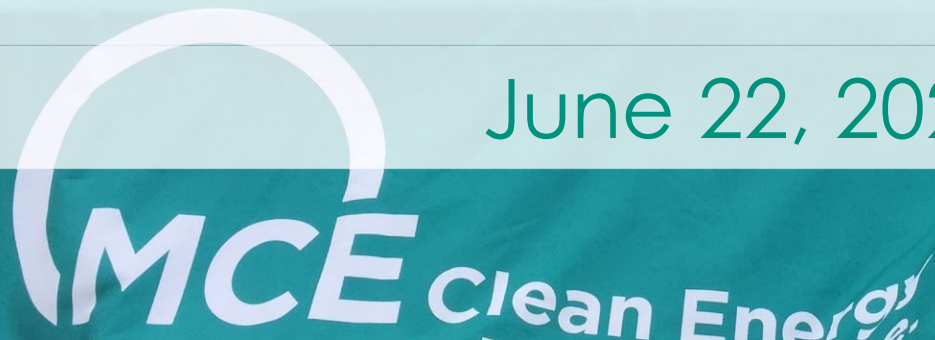

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The USEPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Program

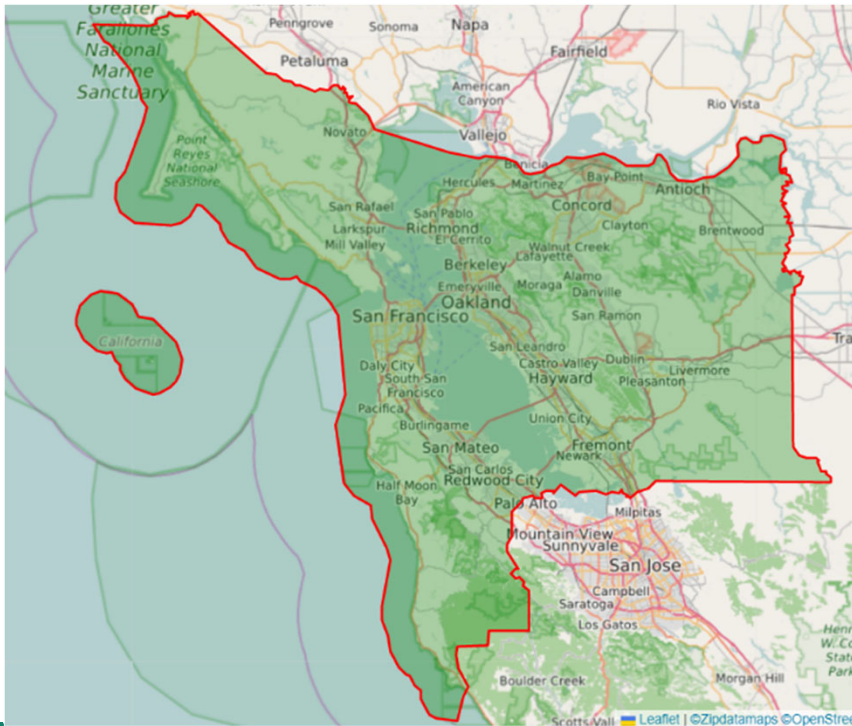
Funding for Climate Planning:

- States get \$3 million
- Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) get **\$1 million**
 - Bay Area has 2 MSAs

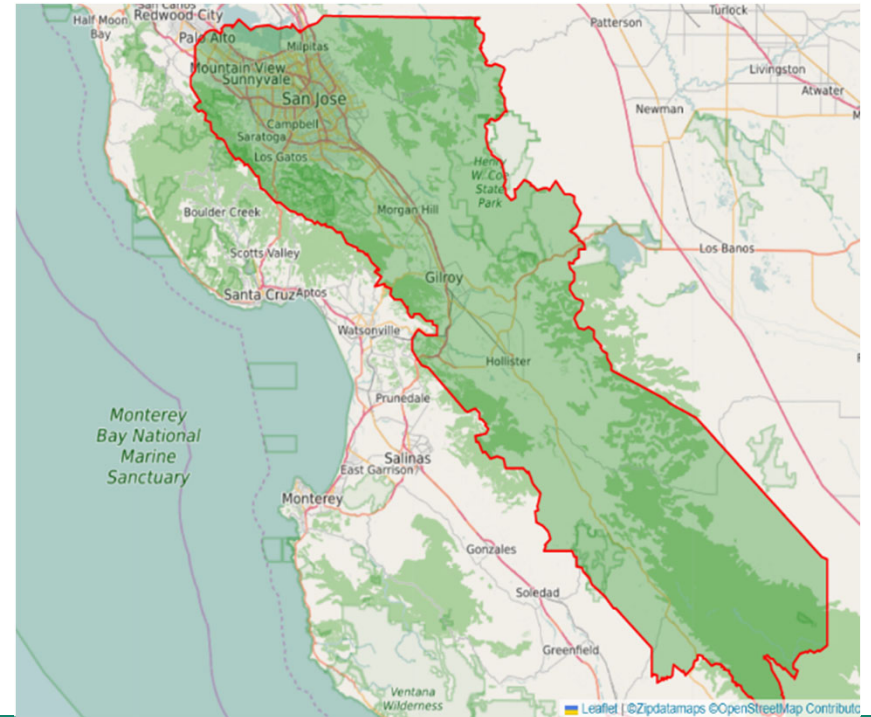
Funding for project implementation:

- Nationally-competitive pot of **\$4.6 billion**
- For projects identified in planning process
- Projects must benefit low-income, disadvantaged communities (LIDACs)

Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin,
San Francisco, San Mateo counties



Santa Clara/San Benito counties



2 Bay Area “MSAs”

The Planning Process

Phase 1: Priority Climate Action Plan

- Simplified, narrative Plan focusing on 1-2 priority sectors;
- Short list of high-priority GHG reduction measures;
- High level LIDACs benefits analysis

Phase 2: Comprehensive Climate Action Plan

- GHG inventory, projections and targets for all sectors;
- Detailed LIDACs benefits analysis;
- Benefits analysis for entire geographic scope;
- Funding availability analysis;
- Workforce analysis

Building Upon Previous Work

Assessment of engagement efforts to date

- Build upon efforts from recent climate action plans, general plans, housing/EJ elements, etc.
- Determine community priorities and concerns
- Develop community-supported criteria for prioritizing projects for funding
- Inform the scope of the LIDAC benefits analysis
- Identify which communities may need/want more targeted engagement by local governments and their partners

Summer 2023	Assess community engagement
Fall 2023	Priority measures criteria and selection
March 1, 2024	Priority Climate Action Plan
Spring/Summer 2024	Funding applications for Priority Climate Action Plan projects
September 2025	Comprehensive Climate Action Plan
